SYNTHESIS

In the coming weeks we will include some of the main themes from the National Synthesis of the Synodal Pathway Consultation sent to Rome this week.

(iv) Lay Ministry

Baptismal calling is at the heart of who we are as Christians. That calling is manifested in a variety of ways, one of which is lay ministry. On the one hand, some respondents see that carrying out the mission of the Church is largely the responsibility of the clergy, while others 8 recognise a call for greater participation of lay people in the life of the Church. Throughout the submissions, we heard similar calls that lay people, should be involved in other more significant leadership and teaching roles ... not just because it will take some burden off the priest, but because it is part of each person's mission as a baptised Catholic. However, there are challenges. These include the perceived passivity of the parish community or wider Church when it comes to lay ministry. There was an overarching thread evident throughout the consultation that the gifts of lay people were under-utilised by the Church. At the national pre-synodal assembly, it was noted that the Church should support lay people in their role as disciples, while a need was felt by some for lay people to take greater personal responsibility for their role in the Church. A submission from returned missionaries who had worked overseas highlighted that much was learned from working with lay colleagues in the various communities in which they served. We had no option but to trust and train lay leaders who gladly undertook the various ministries. In retrospect, it is clear that it was

the actual shortage of ordained ministers that enabled the laity to take their God-given role. While many efforts have been made to enhance the role of lay people in ministry, much remains to be done to encourage, support and provide a training dedicated to enabling lay people in their calling to spread the Good News of Jesus Christ in their faith communities. A call for such training was evident in much of the consultation. It was also acknowledged that while we often speak of an aging clergy we also have an aging laity.

Losing something precious or important is not a pleasant experience. Losing your phone or your wallet with all your plastic cards; access to a quick coffee, to the ATM or your car keys leads to a certain amount of panic and frustration. Losing a child in a crowded supermarket or shopping centre is the stuff of nightmares. Frightening stuff! When we lose something precious we can lose all sense of ourselves. We may not think clearly or rationally.

The three parables in today's Gospel are all about loss – a sheep, a lost coin and a lost child. We are so familiar with this Gospel that we may not hear what it is saying to us. Why would a farmer, for instance, go after one lost sheep to the detriment of the flock? Why would any housekeeper toss and turn their house into a mess to find one lost cent? Why would parents host a party for a delinquent son or daughter? It doesn't make sense. It all seems irrational.

Yet, this is the point of the parables. This is what God is like. He becomes irrational and unpredictable when it comes to love. He loves us like mad! He forgives us no matter what. He will do anything to find us when we are lost. It's a crazy kind of love. This is the Christian way of doing things. We are invited to be crazy with love for those who don't stay within the fold, who don't subscribe to our moral expectations and for those who lose their way in life. We are to go after them, to forgive them and to love them warts and all.

Mother Teresa expressed it: 'Every human being comes from the hand of God and we all know how much God loves us. Whatever our belief, we must learn to forgive if we want to truly love.' (Mother Teresa, The Love of Christ, A Fount Original) AMEN.
